## Crawford: Jinkens keeps striking out

On Nov.17, 2009, City Manager David Jinkens struck out. Here are the three strikes.

One: The City Council by a 4-0 vote rejected the  $CM\hat{a}\in^{m}s$  request to send the finance officer to a conference at a cost of over \$700. Mainly because the CM had violated policy. He approved the trip, paying for it, before it received approval from the council. That $\hat{a}\in^{m}s$  upside down.
