5. Sarah Winnemucca

Although Winnemucca doesn't necessarily fit with the great explorers of the West, she leaves a legacy as of one of the most influential outdoorswomen in state history.

Winnemucca's speeches and writings brought the Paiute Indians and other tribes to the forefront of national discourse on Indian relations.

"She urged education among the Paiutes and worked to help them get along in a white-dominated world," Winnemucca biographer Sally Zanjani said.
