Then and now: Railcar returns to its original intent

According to the Nevada State Railroad Museum, the McKeen Motor Car Company of Nebraska built 152 gasoline-powered "railcars" between 1905 and 1917.

A new McKeen Motor Car (No. 22) entered into service for the Virginia & Truckee Railroad on May 9, 1910, and made roundtrips between Reno and Minden. No. 22 was retired and sold 35 years later.
