
Book review: 'The Stranger' disappoints Coben fans

If you want a fast read that has an interesting cyber-crimes premise, "The Stranger" by Harlan Coben is it. If a book that has undeveloped characters and leaves lots of questions is not to your liking, skip it.

My book club read the "The Stranger" (Dutton 2015) in September. While some liked it, most found it mediocre at best.
