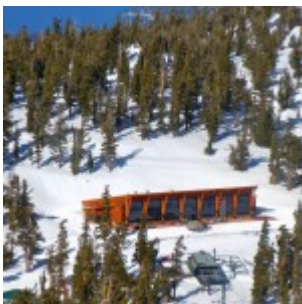


CalStar memberships make great gifts and may be purchased online.
