

CHP offers class to South Tahoe teen drivers

Start Smart is aimed at helping newly licensed and future licensed teenage drivers become aware of the responsibilities that accompany the privilege of being a licensed California driver. The program was created in an effort to preemptively reduce the incidence of teen injuries and deaths resulting from motor vehicle collisions.

Teen drivers and their parents/guardians are invited to attend and participate in a Start Smart class. Recent statistics have shown that in California teenage drivers are injured and are dying in automobile accidents at an alarming rate.

Through candid conversations, officers in attendance will address these facts and provide examples of driving tendencies that put young drivers at risk. This program will help attendees understand that driving is serious and a poor choice behind the wheel of a car can put a person's life and the lives of others in jeopardy.

The next class is Feb. 9 at 6pm at the South Tahoe High School Library. All classes are free and last approximately two hours.

Mt. Rose donates to Haiti relief

Mt. Rose â€” Ski Tahoe made a \$5,000 donation to the Haiti Earthquake Response Fund to aid the victims of the Haiti earthquake. The rounded amount donated represents \$10 per Mt. Rose employee on the 2009-10 payroll.

The devastating earthquakes that hit Haiti in January have resulted in more than 150,000 deaths, untold casualties and severe infrastructure damage. The first 7.0 earthquake was the worst in the region in more than 200 years.

The Mt. Rose donation was made to OXFAM International. Oxfam delivers immediate life-saving assistance to people affected by natural disasters or conflict and helps to build their resilience to future disasters. Oxfam has flown in more than 60 tons of emergency supplies and equipment, including clean water, buckets, water treatment kits, shelters and sanitation tools as part of the Haiti Earthquake Response. Oxfam has reached 85,000 people across seven sites and are working to expand that to 110,000. With water trucks arriving daily now, the focus is on preventing the spread of waterborne disease.

U.S. Ski Team bibs raise \$90,000 for Haiti

PARK CITY -â€ Final tallies revealed Tuesday that the alpine athlete race bibs from the 70th Hahnenkamm men's downhill in Kitzbuehel, Austria and the women's super G in Cortina d'Ampezzo, Italy raised over \$90,000 in online auctions for the earthquake relief effort in Haiti.

The highest earner was Hahnenkamm winner Didier Cuche of Switzerland, whose signed bib was purchased for \$16,209. Bode Miller (Franconia, NH) earned top dollar amongst Americans with \$2,504 raised for Haiti for his bib. Ted Ligety's (Park City, UT) bib also did well going for \$1075.

Newly named 2010 World Cup super G champion Lindsey Vonn (Vail, CO) claimed the top spot amongst women's bibs closing out at just over \$4,000. Julia Mancuso (Olympic Valley, CA), who spearheaded the project for the women's World Cup tour, reported that half of the bibs were purchased by fans from the United States with the other half spread across Austria, Italy, Germany, Belgium, France and Switzerland with all the proceeds going to the American Red Cross.

Controlled burns on North and East shores
